## PROPOSAL IATTC-100 G-1 <u>REV 1</u>

### **SUBMITTED BY ECUADOR**

## SOUTH PACIFIC ALBACORE TUNA

*The Inter-American Tropical Tuna Commission (IATTC)*, gathered in Phoenix, Arizona (USA), on the occasion of its 100<sup>th</sup> Meeting:

*Recalling* its responsibility, established in the Antigua Convention, for the conservation and management of tunas and tuna-like species in the Convention Area and for the formulation of recommendations in this regard to its Members and Cooperating non-Members (CPCs);

*Observing* that south Pacific albacore tuna supports diverse fisheries in areas under national jurisdiction, as well as in areas beyond national jurisdiction, across the breadth of the Pacific Ocean south of the equator, encompassing the convention areas of the IATTC and the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission (WCPFC);

*Emphasizing* the importance of regional and global cooperation to ensure the effective conservation and protection of living aquatic resources throughout their range of distribution, as encouraged in paragraph 12 of Article 6 of the Code of Conduct for Responsible Fisheries of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations;

*Thus recognizing* the importance of working with the WCPFC, as provided for in Article XXIV of the Antigua Convention, in order to manage south Pacific albacore tuna fisheries throughout the migratory range of the stock in the Pacific Ocean south of the equator;

*Recalling further* paragraph 4 of Article 22 of the WCPFC Convention, which provides for cooperation with the IATTC regarding fish stocks that occur in the convention areas of both organizations;

*Encouraged* by recent collaborations in this regard between the scientific staff of the IATTC Secretariat and the Secretariat of the Pacific Community through which a Pacific-wide stock assessment of south Pacific albacore tuna was conducted;

*Observing* that fishing controls for south Pacific albacore tuna are currently in effect exclusively in the waters of the WCPFC Convention Area south of 20°S and that there are currently no controls in effect in the IATTC Convention Area outside the overlap area;

*Considering* the recommendation of the WCPFC Scientific Committee, at its 17<sup>th</sup> meeting, that longline catches of south Pacific albacore tuna be reduced in the WCPFC Convention Area to avoid further and prolonged depletion of vulnerable biomass by adult catches;

*Recalling* that longline fishing vessels greater than 24 meters length overall (LSTLFVs) are highly mobile and can easily change fishing grounds from one ocean to another, so they have a high potential to operate between IATTC and WCPFC convention areas;

*Recalling* Resolution C-03-07 on the establishment of a list of longline fishing vessels over 24 meters (LSTLFVs) authorized to operate in the eastern Pacific Ocean (EPO);

Finally, taking into account Article IV of the Antigua Convention, which calls upon the Members of the

Commission to apply the precautionary approach, as described in the relevant provisions of the Code of Conduct for Responsible Fisheries of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, as well as the 1995 United Nations Fish Stocks Agreement, for the conservation, management, and sustainable use of fish stocks covered by the Convention.

#### *The IATTC therefore resolves that:*

- 1. Members and Cooperating non-Members of the Commission (CPCs) shall not increase the number of their active [LSTLFVs] [tuna longline vessels] that [catch] [target] south Pacific albacore tuna in the Convention area above the average level reported during the recent period (2015-2021 reference or [only the ships that operated in 2021] [recent level (2021)][any chosen year within this periods].
- 2. The Commission shall consider requests from CPCs that did not have active LSTLFVs that caught south Pacific albacore tuna in the Convention Area during the reference period to enter the fishery and revise this resolution, as appropriate.
- 3. CPCs whose vessels [catch]-[target] south Pacific albacore tuna in the Convention Area shall cooperate to ensure the long-term sustainability of the fishery in the IATTC Convention Area, including, inter alia, cooperation and collaboration on research-to reduce uncertainty improve research regarding the status of this stock.
- 4. Under the provisions established in Resolution C-03-05, CPCs shall annually report to the Commission all required data on their respective [LSTLFVs] [fisheries or fleets] that caught south Pacific albacore tuna during the previous calendar year. The data required shall be reviewed annually by SAC follow up the IATTC scientific staff recommendations. The data shall include, inter alia, the number of LSTLFVs that caught south Pacific albacore tuna in the Convention Area and their bycatch.
- 5. The IATTC scientific staff, considering CPCs feedback, should develop and make available data forms as part of the ongoing process to improve data provision under Resolution C-03-05. The forms should be presented and reviewed at SAC-14, and distributed to CPCs and their [LSTLFV fleets] [fisheries or fleets]. The IATTC scientific staff shall make available catch data forms by area and month for albacore tuna fisheries in the south Pacific Ocean with information from 2017 to 2022, as well as byeatch. [The IATTC staff will present spatial and temporal forms template to the SAC in 2023 for adoption at the Commission in 2023]. These forms shall be required from CPCs and their LSTLFV fleets, thus facilitating the catch and effort collection of data, improvement of the stock assessment and addressing ecosystem impacts from fishing activities.
- 6. The IATTC scientific staff shall present during the 14<sup>th</sup> meeting of the SAC data forms developed by the staff and CPCs during the 2022. The SAC should review and adopted proper data forms considering the importance and scope. The IATTC Secretariat shall send the forms referred to in paragraph 5 to the CPCs by 15 October 2022., and After review by the SAC and Commission per paragraph 5, the CPCs shall submit them-forms to the IATTC Secretariat by June 30 each year, 15 February 2023. The IATTC scientific staff shall present a progressing report at the 101<sup>th</sup> IATTC Meeting and a technical report at the 14<sup>th</sup> meeting of the SAC in 20243 based on the data submitted by the CPCs, which shall be considered for future recommendations.
- 7. The Commission shall seek to ensure compatibility between south Pacific albacore tuna conservation measures in the IATTC Convention Area and measures adopted or already in force in the WCPFC Convention Area.
- 8. The Director shall communicate this resolution to the WCPFC Secretariat [within 90 days from adoption].
- 9. This measure will go into effect January 1, 2023 and may be reviewed annually by the IATTC scientific staff and SAC.
